WOODS IN STOCK & USAGE



Beech

Used for furniture, flooring & musical instruments. Often used for woodstrip and woodblock flooring.

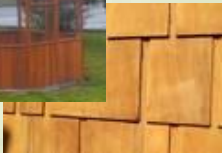
American Cedar

Used for Cabinet making, boatbuilding and light construction.



Western Red Cedar

Reddish brown —non-resinous lightweight softwood with good durability under all conditions. Used for roofing shingles, greenhouses and furniture.



Elm

Used for furniture, joinery, flooring & external cladding. Good for garden and indoor furniture.



Sapele — also known as Mahogany

General hardwood. Major use in furniture, joinery and decorative applications.



Douglas Fir

Softwood, higher than average strength. Used for plywood, heavy construction work, sea defenses.

Silver Fir

Marketed as Whitewood, uses as Douglas fir.

Hemlock

Softwood with straight, even grain. Not very durable, used for interior work generally, also crates & boxes.



Oak

Wide range of applications; furniture, fittings, flooring. Very strong and durable.

Pine

Wide range of applications including furniture, flooring and utility uses. Durable, suitable for outdoor use.



Hardwoods — Hardwood trees are generally broadleaved trees and are deciduous. These include ash, elm, oak, maple, walnut and mahogany.

Softwoods — Softwoods are one of the groups of trees that have needle or scale-like leaves; are evergreen and have longer length fibres than hardwoods.
